DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Joan Didion had a surgical ability to notice and to dissect cultural and political movements and ideas that was entirely her own. Known for her sense of clarity and precision of language, she composed some of the most memorable and incisive essays about American life in the late 20th century. And then she was faced with the unfathomable: death, and the profound loss that follows when loved ones leave this world. Where do they go? How do we carry on?

She did what she could: she wrote. It was an inevitability.

Widely regarded as the first great secular book about grief, "The Year of Magical Thinking" became a global phenomenon; it spurred a Netflix documentary ("The Centre Will Not Hold"), it inspired other artists, it gave us language to handle the complicated and often contradictory feelings we experience in such life-altering circumstances.

And then, of course, the book spun off into the play, premiering in 2007 on Broadway with Vanessa Redgrave as "Joan", under the direction of Sir David Hare. And here you are, now, witnessing this extraordinary text in a new, all-Winnipeg production.

Actor Monique Marcker "embodies" Joan Didion - or rather, the essence of Didion. It is not meant to be an impersonation. The point is the words; the sonic experience of being inside a mind that is desperately trying to piece together the events that led to a cataclysmic moment.

Joan Didion led an adventurous and somewhat eccentric life, mingling with Hollywood types and the high society of New York intellectuals. She did not hide the fact that her life was a privileged one. In our current world of hyper connectivity, we are all too painfully aware of the injustices that unfold in places far from us. We are over-exposed, daily. It is overwhelming.

And so, it is easy for us today to dismiss much of Didion's perspective as "out of touch". What does a fancy, rich white lady from New York have to say about suffering, really?!

Well, as it turns out, quite a bit: 90 (very detailed) minutes of it - as you'll see and hear in this play. I find it impossible not to be absorbed by the titanic size of her brain, and the expansive canvas of her soul. And, most importantly: her privilege did not prevent her from experiencing the profound pain that binds us all together. No one is spared. That is what she is here to tell you.

The Year of Magical Thinking, the play, was Didion's bridge project between writing the book and what followed next: her final memoir, "Blue Nights", which centred around her daughter, Quintana. Though the play carries the same title as the book about her life with husband John Dunne, "The Year of Magical Thinking" onstage goes further than the book, as it begins to address events about Quintana that were then expanded into "Blue Nights" – do get both books after seeing this play and dive deeper into one of the great minds of our time.

I hope you leave the theatre feeling a bit more connected to this precarious and beautiful project we call Humanity.

MEET THE PLAYWRIGHT

Joan Didion

Joan Didion was born in Sacramento in 1934 and graduated from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1956. After graduation, Didion moved to New York and began working for Vogue, which led to her career as a journalist and writer. Didion published her first novel, *Run River*, in 1963. Didion's other novels include *Play It As It Lays* (1970), *A Book of Common Prayer* (1977), *Democracy* (1984), and *The Last Thing He Wanted* (1996).

Didion's first volume of essays, Slouching Towards Bethlehem, was published in 1968, and her second, The White Album, was published in 1979. Her nonfiction works include Salvador (1983), Miami (1987), After Henry (1992), Political Fictions (2001), Where I Was From (2003), We Tell Ourselves Stories in Order to Live (2006), Blue Nights (2011), South and West (2017) and Let Me Tell You What I Mean (2021). Her memoir The Year of Magical Thinking won the National Book Award for Nonfiction in 2005.

In 2005, Didion was awarded the American Academy of Arts & Letters Gold Medal in Belles Lettres and Criticism. In 2007, she was awarded the National Book Foundation's Medal for Distinguished Contribution to American Letters. A portion of the National Book Foundation citation read: "An incisive observer of American politics and culture for more than forty-five years, Didion's distinctive blend of spare, elegant prose and fierce intelligence has earned her books a place in the canon of American literature as well as the admiration of generations of writers and journalists." In 2013, she was awarded a National Humanities Medal by President Barack Obama and the PEN Center USA's Lifetime Achievement Award.

Didion said of her writing: "I write entirely to find out what I'm thinking, what I'm looking at, what I see and what it means." She died in December 2021

Rodrigo Beilfuss is a theatre director, an actor and an educator. He is currently the Artistic Director of Winnipeg's Shakespeare in the Ruins (SIR). Rodrigo was a member of the Stratford Festival between 2015 and 2019, working as an actor and director. He trained at the University of Winnipeg (BA Honours) and at the Birmingham Conservatory for Classical Theatre in Stratford; and he also holds an MA in Classical Acting from the London Academy

of Music & Dramatic Art (LAMDA) in England. As a director, Rodrigo is a graduate of the Michael Langham Workshop for Classical Direction from Stratford. Born in Santa Maria, Brazil, Rodrigo left his tropical home in 2001 when he was 18 and relocated to Winnipeg (...from fire to ice). Since then, it's all been one long and wonderful ride full of mistakes and pleasures, some wins, discoveries, and these days a lot of time spent with his little children, or buying books he's never going to have time to read, or listening to podcasts while doing laundry late at night and wondering 'how did I get here?!'


